#### Satisfactory completion of a course

Students must:

follow the course developed or endorsed by NESA, apply themselves with diligence and sustained effort to the set tasks and experiences provided in the course by the school, and achieve some or all of the course outcomes

VET Board Developed Courses require students to complete mandatory work placement.

# Additional completion requirements for HSC courses

Students must:

- complete HSC assessment tasks that contribute in excess of 50% of available marks in courses where internal assessment marks are submitted and
- sit for and make a serious attempt at any requisite Higher School Certificate examinations for a course

### Finalising marks/ranks

- At the end of the Year 12 course, the marks for each task are aggregated using the weightings previously published in the PHHS Assessment Booklet, to arrive at a final assessment mark for each student.
- These marks are submitted to NESA, and provide a RANK ORDER of students.
- Results are then moderated by NESA to ensure that marks submitted by different schools can be compared.



#### Assessment

- Four tasks per 2 unit course including the Trial HSC
- These assessment marks are submitted to NESA as a mark /100, and will form 50% of your final HSC mark. The HSC Examination is worth 50%.
- English Studies and Mathematics Standard 1 are different - unless you choose to sit the optional HSC Examination.



#### Assessment

- The Assessment Booklet is an extremely important document. It gives the details of your tasks: dates, weighting, components etc.
- All work that you present in an HSC task / exam must be your own. Malpractice, including plagiarism, makes you liable to receive zero marks for the task. Remember All My Own Work?

Understanding the difference between HSC marks and ATAR

#### HIGHER SCHOOL CERTIFICATE

The HSC presents a profile showing the STANDARDS a student achieves in the courses they studied

#### AUSTRALIAN TERTIARY ADMISSION RANK

A student's ATAR is a RANK indicating their achievement not against a standard, but against other students



#### HSC and ATAR differences

#### HSC

Raw HSC marks are not scaled – they are aligned to standards ie moderated to meet the standards within bands

#### ATAR

Each course is scaled not against a standard but against the quality of the entire HSC candidature A new mark value is assigned for each course An aggregate is given to form a RANK ORDER



#### ATAR Scaling Philosophy



The scaling model looks for the "strength of the competition" or the "company you're in" or the "quality of the candidature"



### **Students Online**


- This website is important it is how NESA will communicate with you. It includes information and advice to help you.


Senior study periods during the day are supervised in the Library, and assistance is available.

### Senior study lessons

- All study periods that fall in Period 2 and 3 are supervised and the roll is marked, just as any other lesson would be. All students report to the Library and swipe in.
- These periods are a combination of structured lessons and individual study.
- Study periods that fall in Periods 1 or 4 may be spent at home. The Library is also open ...

...all students are to be at school **every lesson** until all Learning Contracts are returned.



### Discontinuing a course

Some students choose to discontinue one of their courses.

The process for this is as follows:

- Meet with Ms Payne
- Complete paperwork
- When your application has been processed, you are placed on the Senior Study rolls.

This is when you are able to cease attending the discontinued class.



### Senior study lessons

We need the consent of a supervising teacher in the workshop.



### 10% on Top program

Every Year 12 student is allotted a 10% on Top mentor.

This program operates along traditional mentoring lines, allowing students to benefit from the advice and expertise of Year 12 teachers.



#### HSC Disability Provisions

Disability provisions provide students with practical support to access, i.e. read and respond to, the Higher School Certificate (HSC) exams.

NESA Disability Provisions

Students who believe they qualify for disability provisions should see Mrs Amy Austin, Head Teacher Student Wellbeing.



#### Tips for managing stress

- 1. Take time out: give yourself permission to recharge. Try and get outside for a walk to get away from the computer.
- 2. Make a study plan: set yourself a list and act on it; take bite-sized chunks out of the study so that you can feel a sense of achievement.
- **3. Challenge your thinking.** Often we give better advice to others than we give to ourselves . . . hearing your own feelings from someone else can help you take action
- **4. Talk about it.** All Year 12 are going through this as well. Share the experience with each other.
- 5. Reach out: seek help from one of the many services available such as headspace, Kids Helpline, Reachout, Lifeline and Beyond Blue.
