





The number of courses you study depends on how many courses you can realistically manage and succeed in. Generally, courses are two units and to be eligible for the HSC you must successfully complete at least 12 units of study in Year 11 and at least 10 units in Year 12.

You must also study at least four subjects. Mathematics is a subject; within that subject there are a number of courses – Mathematics General 2, Mathematics, HSC Mathematics Extension 1 and HSC Mathematics Extension 2.

Both the Year 11 and Year 12 pattern of study must include:

- 2 units of compulsory English
- at least 6 units of Board Developed Courses
- at least 3 courses of 2 units value or greater
- at least 4 subjects (including English)
- A maximum of 6 units of Science may be included in the Year 11 pattern of study
- A maximum of 7 units of Science may be included in the Year 12 pattern of study

FAQ's



Yes. It is possible to achieve a high ATAR regardless of courses studied. However, it is important to note that students who achieve very high ATARs are usually placed in the top group of students in all of their courses.




Not necessarily. While you may achieve a higher position in lower level maths, that course will tend to have a lower scaled mean to counteract the higher position. You should do the level of maths that suits your ability and future plans. Also remember that bonus points are more likely to be awarded for the higher level maths courses.






Courses have to be scaled so that marks in different courses can be compared with each other. Courses are scaled using the mean scores and distribution of marks, which indicate the ability of the course candidature. Courses such as HSC Mathematics Extension 2 and Physics traditionally scale well because of this. However, students must achieve high HSC marks (and high positions) to gain any benefit from scaling.




The **underlying principle** is that you should <u>neither be</u> advantaged nor disadvantaged by choosing one course over another. The scaling process is designed to encourage you to study courses you enjoy, are good at, and that best prepare you for future study – just about any combination of courses can lead to a good ATAR – but make sure you *understand eligibility rules*.








HSC Certificate - How your marks are reported

Moderation of assessment marks


- All raw HSC assessment marks submitted by schools are moderated by NESA in a process called Moderation
- Moderation adjusts the raw assessments submitted by schools so that the mean (average) of the group's assessments is set to equal the mean of the HSC exam marks obtained by the group
- The top assessment mark is set to equal the top exam mark
- The rank order as submitted by the school of students remains unchanged in their group

The ATAR is a rank between 0.00 and 99.95 with increments of 0.05. It is used by UAC participating institutions to rank and select school leavers for admission to most undergraduate courses. Some courses use selection criteria other than, or in addition to, the ATAR. If you are eligible to have a Limited ATAR calculated it will be sent to you on a separate advice. The Limited ATAR is calculated differently to the ATAR. General aspects of the ATAR

- The ATAR assists universities in RANKING (top to bottom) applicants for universities
- The best 10 units (2 of which could be a category B) of ATAR-eligible courses are used to determine your ATAR based on your performance vs. that of your peers. 2 units of English will be included
- The ATAR is calculated and released by the Universities Admissions Centre (UAC)
- The ATAR is a rank. It is not a mark.
- A student's ATAR indicates the POSITION of that student relative to their Year 7 cohort
- 2021 ATAR of 80.00 placed in top 20% of their Year 7 cohort if all the 2016 Year 7 students completed Year 12
- Schools do not receive ATARs



Scaling allows for your marks to be compared against not just those of other students in the same courses you studied, but also to the marks of other students in other courses...




