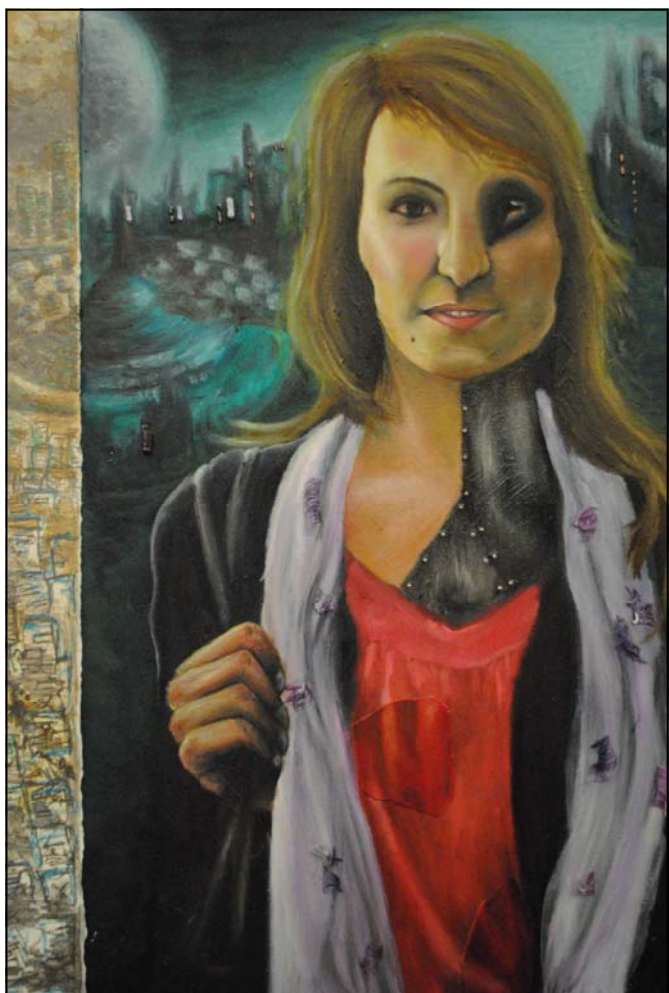

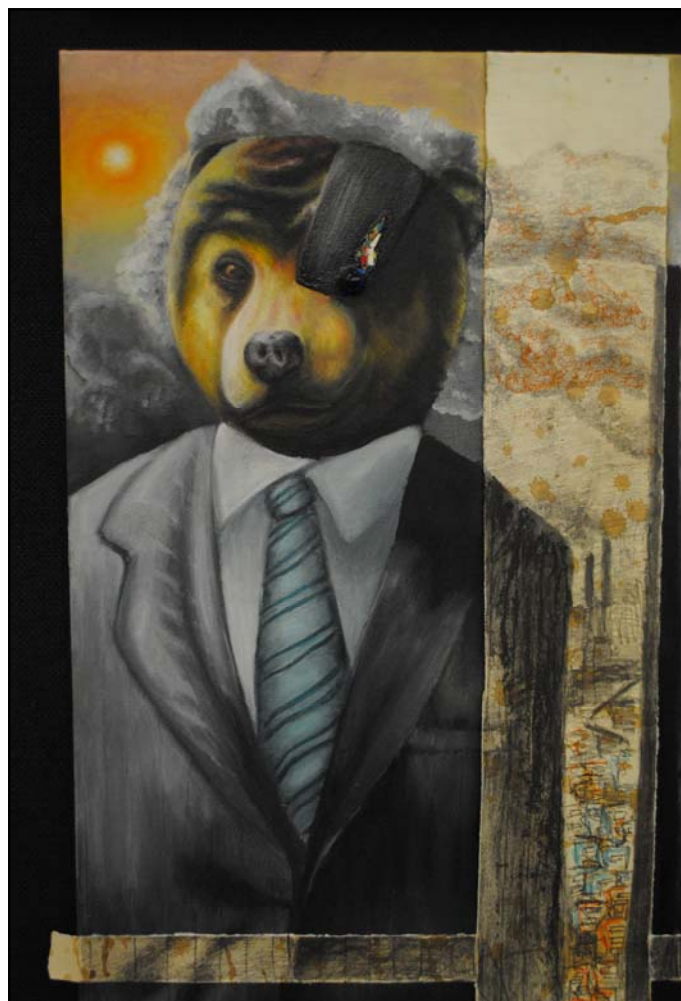

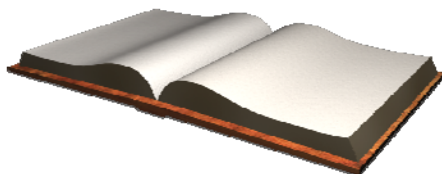

INFORMATION FROM HORNSBY KU-RING-GAI CHILD AND FAMILY HEALTH SERVICE '*Health Promoting Schools Newsletter Summer 12/13*'

As the school holidays are fast approaching, our primary thoughts are of activities for children, child safety and sun protection. Following are some tips for enjoying the summer holidays.

SUMMER FUN

It can take as little as 15 minutes for sunburn and skin damage to occur. UV radiation levels are strongest in the middle of the day so plan to be outdoors before 11am or after 3pm in daylight saving time—or before 10am and after 2pm during the rest of the year.

SUN SMART DRESSING

Remember to wear the right clothing.

Swimwear: Rash vests are sold in all sizes and when worn with long shorts are sun sensible solutions for swimwear. Look for vests that have an ultraviolet protection factor (UPF) level on their tags. A UPF of 50+ gives the best protection.

Hats: Hats should be worn whenever children are outside and provide protection to the face, neck and ears.

Sunglasses: Some kids love these as a fashion accessory but they also as important to protect young eyes from UV radiation damage. The best styles are close fitting wraparound sunglasses that stop UV radiation rays from getting in from the side and meet the Australian Standard AS1067.

Sunscreen: Sunscreen is an important sun protection measure, however, it does not offer 100 percent protection from the sun. To get the most protection, sunscreen should be applied 20 minutes before going outside. Use broad-spectrum SPF30+ water resistant sunscreen on areas not protected by clothing. Remember to reapply every two hours or more often if wiped, sweated or washed off.

BAND NEWS

Changing circumstances of staffing at Pennant Hills High School has meant that our very accomplished Conductor of Concert Band 1, Carol Coomber, will not longer be able to fulfil her role as Conductor and we are currently looking to replace Carol with an equally talented Conductor.

Carol has conducted the bands at Pennant Hills High School for the past twelve years and has provided our students musicians with excellent leadership and musicianship. We thank her most sincerely for her commitment to the band program. Carol will be teaching four days per week at Pennant Hills High School next year and will still be heavily involved in the band program, albeit in a very different capacity.

At our recent End of Year Concert, Carol was thanked by the Band Prefects on behalf of the staff at Pennant Hills High School, the band students and the parents involved in the band program. At was a fitting finale to the year and to Carol's time as Conductor of Concert Band 1.
