CONGRATULATIONS NICHOLAS -HORNSBY ADVOCATE'S SPORTS PERSON OF THE WEEK

Nicholas, a student of Pennant Hills High School who has recently graduated from Year 12 has been featured in the Hornsby Advocate as their Sports Person of the Week for his outstanding ability in Athletics. The following is a profile on Nicholas' rise to an elite level in this highly competitive sport:

Nicholas did a few sports when he was younger hockey, soccer, rugby league, but athletics was the one thing he loved since starting in the U6's group at Hornsby Little Athletics. He liked competing in the different events, with long jump and high jump being his favourite events from the beginning. He had coaching in these events and qualified for State competitions. He usually qualified for hurdles as well - without training in hurdles. After some time, long jump and high jump became difficult as the constant jarring affected his ankles, hampering his ability to compete.

Almost three years ago, Nicholas started to train with a great group of hurdlers and sprinters at Cherrybrook Athletics Club. The squad, comprising of State and National champions as well as many record holders, added a new and more gruelling dimension to his training, which he attends a few times every week. His coach Mick Zitzi and training partners taught him the correct techniques and he improved rapidly with their guidance. Nicholas got better results with each season that followed. He is very motivated to keep improving and getting stronger and faster.

Winning State and National medals, as well as recently representing Australia in Fiji, keeps Nicholas striving to reach the elite levels of competition Athletics offers. In 2015, Nicholas competed at the NSWCHS Athletics Championship where he won Silver in the 200m and Bronze in the 100m hurdles. He also reached the finals in the 100m and 4x100m relay at the same championship. Earlier in 2015, at the Australian Junior Athletics Championships he received a Bronze medal in the 110m hurdles and at the NSW Little Athletics Championship he received a Silver medal in the same event.

Travelling interstate and overseas, and getting to meet so many different people has been very rewarding for Nicholas. He has had an opportunity to become friends with people who have the same interest and high ability in Athletics, catching up with them at the various events each season which adds to the great experience.

Nicolas goals in athletics in the future are: to win Gold at a National Athletics Championships Competition; Compete at the World Junior

Championships in Finland in 2018; and Compete at an Open International event. He loves hurdling and sprinting, and hopes to keep on improving with each season that passes.

Congratulations Nicholas on your outstanding achievements to date. We look forward to hearing about your National and hopefully International successes in the coming years.
